I am incredibly proud of how as a club community we have banded together to ensure a smooth transition for our members and am sure this spirit will lead the club to great success and see our vision through of creating a strong community minded club that provides pathways for our athletes that allows them to meet their swimming goals, whether that is success at their school swimming carnival or success at the highest level.



The year 2023 marks a significant milestone for the City of Perth Swimming Club, as we proudly celebrate a century of swimming. HEAD OF PROGRAMS REPORT

Since taking over the program at Perth City I am extremely proud of how we have managed to bounce back and we are now enjoying a growing and healthy number in our programs. From hitting a key milestone early of 50 members from 13th of December we have continued to go from strength to strength with our membership base now at 86 members what is fantastic to still have a steady increase over the winter months.

The breakdown of these members are:

This shows great opportunity for the future with a strong base of juniors and a great pathway for them to follow. Our approach of programming for the athlete's needs has shown great promise with over 65% of our new members begin from direct referral and the rest coming from our various advertising strategies such as local partnerships and social media. The club may well be 100 years young, but it is our future which I'm most excited about. Our swimmers continue to impress in the pool and we all look forward to see what they can achieve for themselves.



TREASURER'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2023

I am pleased to present the Treasurer's Report for the year ended 30 June 2023. This last season has been a period of great change for our club, marked by a new structure, a new training provider, and a return to our roots as the City of Perth Swimming Club.

Amidst this, I returned to the role of Treasurer at the club, fully aware of the need to navigate this transition effectively. My primary objectives were to A) ensure the financial stability for our club and B) identify sustainable revenue avenues for the club.



In today's uncertain economic landscape, and as we continue to emerge from the COVID-19 pandemic, the need for financial stability remains as paramount as ever. A significant change in the club last season was the change in training provider, which brought with it a new responsibility of covering Beatty Park's monthly lane hire fees. These costs, estimated to be \$3,000 to \$3,500 per month, have presented a considerable financial commitment for our club. In response, we've had to be extra careful with our spending this year so as not to rely upon or eat into the club's savings too heavily.

Fortunately, the combined efforts of our committee, parents, and swimmers have helped us to weather this to an extent, and we have raised much needed funds to help offset these costs. Asides from club membership income, successful endeavours like the Tommy Sugo fundraiser, and our flagship swimming meets, the Perth City Long Course and Short Course Classics have played a pivotal role (raising funds of approx. \$20,000).

As always, these initiatives require many volunteers, and it's been a delight to see our members offer their time, help, and enthusiasm when coming together to make these possible. Despite the challenges with lane hire, we have managed to limit the club's losses to \$5,422 for the fiscal year ending 30 June 2023. At this date, our cash position stands strong at \$56,401.

However, it is crucial we recognise that these losses are not sustainable in the long run. We will need to establish additional revenue sources which are reliable, can help us to restore a positive net income for our club, and will ultimately lead us to more financial sustainability. This is critical in allowing us to effectively support our swimmers in their pursuits and to provide the best club experience for our members in the years ahead.

Our swimmers and their families form the very essence of this club, and we ultimately hold the reins of its future. Over this past year, particularly during our toughest moments, I've witnessed so much support from our community. The fact we managed to navigate through these has been a true testament to the dedication of our members, and it gives me a lot of hope for ahead. For that, I thank you.
